- Between 2010 and 2014, the overall population grew 5.3%.
- With over 38,000 residents, and more than 17,000 households, it's the sixth largest city in Fulton County.
- The name "East Point" derives from the fact that this is the terminus of the Atlanta & West Point Railroad in the east; West Point Georgia, is the terminus where the rail line ends in the west.
- This settlement was founded as a railroad terminus with 16 families in 1870, but quickly became an inviting place for industry to develop.

Why the Georgia Public Service Commission Election is Important

The Georgia Public Service Commission (PSC) plays a crucial role in overseeing and regulating essential public utilities across the state. Comprised of five elected commissioners, the PSC is responsible for regulating electric, natural gas, telecommunications, and intrastate transportation services. One of its most significant responsibilities is setting utility rates—determining how much customers pay for services like electricity and gas.

When utility companies propose infrastructure projects, such as building new power plants or expanding the electric grid, they must first obtain approval from the PSC. The Commission also decides who bears the financial burden of these projects—whether costs should be passed on to consumers or absorbed by the utility companies themselves. This gives the PSC substantial influence over household utility bills and long-term energy planning in Georgia.

However, the PSC's regulatory authority has limits. It does not oversee services such as water utilities, cellular phone service, or broadband internet, which fall under different jurisdictions or private market regulation. Despite this, the Commission's decisions have a significant impact on economic development, environmental sustainability, and public health across the state.




Since December 2022, the PSC has approved three Georgia Power rate increases, raising residential rates by 28% since 2021. Since 2020, the average household is paying about \$43 more per month for electricity.

Delayed Democracy: The Public Service Commission Election Controversy in Georgia

For the first time since 2020, Georgia voters will have the opportunity to vote for members of the Public Service Commission (PSC)—but only in 2025. Although PSC elections were originally scheduled for 2022, a federal judge delayed them after ruling in favor of a lawsuit filed by Georgia WAND and Georgia Conservation Voters. The lawsuit argued that the current statewide election system—where all Georgians vote for every commissioner, rather than just the one representing their district—diluted the voting power of Black residents and violated the federal Voting Rights Act.

While a federal appeals court overturned that ruling in November 2023, the case remained unresolved, leading to the cancellation of the 2024 election as well. In response, Georgia lawmakers passed legislation in 2024 to extend the terms of the sitting commissioners and resume elections in 2025. However, that new law is also facing legal challenges, keeping the future of PSC elections uncertain.

This drawn-out legal battle underscores how electoral systems—even at the state level—can have profound implications for representation, civil rights, and public accountability. As the PSC plays a key role in setting utility rates and approving energy infrastructure, who sits on the Commission directly affects the lives and wallets of millions of Georgians.



In 2023, the PSC allowed Georgia Power to increase customer utility rates to cover \$7.6 billion, roughly 74%, of the overrun for the long-delayed Plant Vogtle nuclear reactors. This rate increased the average customer's electric bill by almost \$9 per month.

College Park Demographics

- The community that became College Park was founded as Atlantic City in 1890 as a depot on the Atlanta and West Point Railroad.
- The town was renamed Manchester when it was incorporated as a city in 1891.
- It was renamed again as the City of College Park in 1896. The city's name came from being the home of Cox College (*where the City Hall now stands*) and Georgia Military Academy (*now the Woodward Academy*).
- Due to its proximity between the airport and downtown Atlanta, College Park is home to more than 5,000 hotel rooms.
- Originating from a land grant awarded in 1846, College Park has the fourth largest urban historic district in Georgia with 867 structures on the Historic Register. The City's historical collection consists of homes, monuments, businesses, schools, churches, parks, a cemetery, government building, and railway station.
